The Summer Conference 2021 bills have been paid and we currently show a profit of nearly \$2,000. Many thanks to Michael Hummel and to Melissa Walsh for their excellent planning for this year. Thanks, also to Ryan Knight, who set up our Zoom portal and fixed our technical problems during the virtual part of our conference. Thank you to all of you who attended in person and via your computers. When we divide the expenses of excellent clinicians among many conference attendees, it is easy to provide better and

better conference experiences for all of us.

Currently our balances in checking and savings accounts are \$11,570.67 and \$29,561.58, respectively. This is about \$2,000 less than the amount we had last year at this time.

Many of you pay your annual membership dues in the fall. Your membership expires during the month in which you joined or last paid your dues. As a friendly reminder, many of your colleagues' dues are being paid by their schools, music booster organizations, or churches. It might be worth investigating. You may

Our St. Joseph, Jasper church choir began singing together again on Memorial Day weekend. We wear masks and keep one empty chair between singers when seated. Our county continues to report about 40 new Covid cases per day. We are designated an orange zone. After singing together in church for the summer, we closed the building to continue a \$10 million restoration and refurbishing project on our 141-yearold church. We currently have scaffolding around our 230-foot bell tower with men visible walking around the top of the tower as they make repairs. While the church is closed; our masses continue in Kundek Hall in our Parish Center. Our choir sings from a balcony and our parishioners enjoy the cozy feel of our smaller space. We continue to wear masks and maintain as much social distancing as possible. I will keep you posted on our progress.





Selecting Literature Dan Andersen

Welcome back to school/church everyone! I hope your year has gotten off to a great start. I am excited to be back with full classrooms, without masks (both for the time being I'm afraid!). I know that picking literature is on our minds, in fact most of us probably spent much of our summer doing the work that will set us up for success throughout the year. This process has always been exciting for me. I get to hear all the new releases by my favorite publishing companies.

Speaking of publishing companies, I want to challenge all of us before I continue with the purpose of the article. Please purchase as much new music as you can afford this year. The pandemic has been very hard on the publishers, composers/arrangers, those who print the music, and on the local dealers (like Beth at Sweetwater). Many of you were not able to do much singing in your schools or churches, and if you did, you more than likely used music from your library. Now it's time for new beginnings! There is so much beautiful, challenging, entertaining, stunning new choral music out right now! Please challenge yourself to look for new music to help our choral community get back on its feet!

Why is picking out the right music for our choirs so important? There are several reasons. One of the most obvious is that we need to match the difficulty of the literature with our choir. If we are doing 12 pieces with a choir this year, give them 3 songs that will really challenge them, 3 songs that they will learn quickly, and 6 that are right at their level. Too many pieces that are over their heads will cause frustration just like too many easy pieces will cause boredom. To me the most important thing that picking out appropriate literature will do for your choir is keeping your singers engaged. Keeping your singers engaged is imperative to excellent classroom management, and to efficient church choir rehearsals. The term "Authentic Engagement" is big in the current teacher evaluation rubrics. If your 7th grade boys are not actively engaged in something constructive, they will find something to do with their time....I would have! I have stories! This also goes for those tenors in the back row of your church choir during rehearsal. Come to think of it, that's me now! Sorry, Matt Kauffman!

What areas should we look at to help us find engaging music for our choirs. First, we should consider the text. Is it interesting? Is it meaningful? Is it silly or a novelty text? Is it in a foreign language? Next, consider the range and tessitura of the song. Then see if the piece is musically interesting melodically, harmonically, texturally, dynamically, etc. Consider the familiarity of the piece, whether it's a pop song, folk song with a familiar melody, or a hymn arrangement. Does the song connect with other subjects (African folk song if your 7th graders are studying Africa) or the sermon theme? These are all things that will help your singers connect with a song and stay engaged.

Finding the right literature for your choirs can be very time consuming. I added up the songs that I listened to one summer and it was over 1,200! Spending the time to find the right literature for your choirs will pay many dividends. Your singers will be more engaged, especially your young men. There

will be more buy in, which results in greater effort. They will allow you to "push" them a little more all the time. You will be able to give them more difficult literature and a larger variety of music. One of our jobs is to make sure we are providing them with a variety of quality music that will help them grow as singers, musicians, and people of the world. If we do this well, our students will run to our class like they run to lunch, and our church choir members will find fewer reasons to stay at home and miss rehearsals.

This will be a very important year to find the right music for our choirs. I think it's even more important than last year. First, many choirs were not able to meet in person and sing together. Many were in a hybrid situation, and those who were able to sing were singing with masks and social distancing. Secondly, our country is still in disarray and needs a tremendous amount of healing.

At our core, we are all educators, and choral music, at its core, educates. I believe we have an obligation, through appropriate, challenging, quality choral music, to educate and challenge our singers and our communities. We have an opportunity this year to help our country pick up the pieces of humanity one choir at a time. Have a great year making incredible music with the beautiful humans in your choirs!

Repertoire and Resources Report

David Stone, Chair

Hello there! I hope that this year has started off well. We all are facing challenges in our situations but all of us are resilient and will be able to overcome anything that comes our way. I want to introduce myself and my team in the Repertoire and Resources positions of the Repertoire Specific area. My name is David Stone and I am currently the Choral and Handbell Director at Highland Hills Middle School in Georgetown Indiana. We are the feeder school to Floyd Central High School. I

direct two mixed gender treble ensembles in 5th and 6th grade, one 7th and 8th Treble Ensemble, One 7th and 8th Cambiata/Baritone Ensemble, and two handbell ensembles daily. I have served as R & R chair for Children and Youth Choirs for the last 4 years and before that was the Men's Choir R & R coordinator for 4 years. I am excited to be back in the Repertoire Specific area. My goal is to help people find good, challenging and accessible music for their groups. Not just for the ISSMA lists but to help with finding repertoire that will work in all situations. I will be working in the area of Treble Choirs (SA, SSA, SSAA). Now I want to introduce you all to the rest of the Repertoire Specific team



First, let me introduce Kyle Barker. Kyle is a Choral Director at Carmel High School. He is the ICDA R & R representative for Show Choirs. Kyle's goal in this area is to provide resources for both new and veteran teachers on how to find quality arrangements/arrangers for their groups that can work and be adapted for all levels of experience. He adds, "It can be very frustrating to want to do pop and Broadway music with your groups and to seemingly only find music that either isn't exciting or is not written well for the group you have. But the good music is there, and there's a lot of it...and more and more, arrangers are starting to pay more attention to band charts, needs for dance breaks, etc...the process is getting better, and I'm really passionate about helping directors find good popular music that will encourage buy-in from the students and be of a quality that is educationally sound and beneficial to the students!"



Second, I want to introduce to you our R & R for World Music. Dr. Madlen Batchvarova is a Professor of Music and Director of Choral Programs at Hanover College. Her goal for this area is to help Indiana choral directors discover the accessibility of world choral music. In the words of Hermann Steinherr - "The greatest significance of people is that no matter what their race and tribe, no matter what their color and religion they bond with each other is based on emotions, sentiments and feelings." She adds, "Including world music into the choral concert programs affords our choristers and audiences the opportunity to grow in awareness, understanding, and appreciation of the diverse human experiences in the USA and abroad. Knowledge of others is also knowledge of self."

Our third area is Vocal Jazz and will be led by R & R representative Mark Yount. Mark is the Choral Director at Martinsville High School. We are thrilled to have Mark working in this are as it is one of his areas of expertise. 


Graduate Assistantships Available in Choral Conducting for Fall 2022

Jessica Nápoles, ASHC Conductor

Jessica Nápoles is Professor of Choral Music Education at the University of North Texas. She teaches undergraduate coursework in choral methods, conducts the Concert Choir, and mentors graduate students in research. Dr. Nápoles served as Interim division chair for Conducting & Ensembles in 2019-2020 and Interim division chair for Music Education in Fall of 2020. A native of Florida with a Cuban-American background, Dr. Nápoles taught middle school chorus in the public schools of Miami and Orlando, FL. She received her Bachelor of Music Education, Master of Music Education, and PhD in

Music Education from the Florida State University. Prior to her appointment at UNT, she taught at the University of Utah for 11 years.

Dr. Nápoles is an active conductor, clinician, and adjudicator, frequently engaging in guest conducting opportunities locally, regionally, and nationally. She has conducted All State and honor choirs in Arkansas, California, Delaware, Florida, Idaho, Louisiana, Maine, Massachusetts, New York, Oregon, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, Wisconsin, and Utah. She has conducted the Southern, North Central/Central, and Western division honor choirs for the American Choral Directors Association (ACDA). In 2019, Dr. Nápoles made her Carnegie Hall debut as choral conductor for the WorldStrides OnStage Honors Performance Series. She was asked to return in 2020 and again in 2021.

In addition to her conducting invitations, Dr. Nápoles is a well-known researcher, with numerous publications in journals such as the *Journal of Research in Music Education*, *Bulletin of the Council for Research in Music Education*, *Journal of Music Teacher Education*, *Update: Applications of Research in Music Education*, and the *International Journal of Music Education*. She is currently serving 6-year terms on the editorial boards of the *Journal of Research in Music Education*, the premier research journal in music education and the *International Journal of Research in Choral Singing*, the ACDA research journal. Her research interests include music teacher education, testing practitioner practices empirically, expressive conducting, and teacher talk. She has presented at conferences on these topics nationally and internationally.

Dr. Nápoles is meaningfully engaged with the American Choral Directors Association (ACDA) at the national level. She is currently a member of the Research Standing Committee. Additionally, she served as Assistant Conference Chair for the 2019 Kansas City Conference and previously as the Honor Choir Coordinator for the 2015 conference in Salt Lake City and the 2017 conference in Minneapolis. Additionally, she served as Assistant Conference chair for the 2021 virtual conference and the 2019 Kansas City Conference, and previously led the writing team in drafting a COVID-19 task force for ACDA.
